What's the buzz? Well, this time of year, the buzz you are hearing can only be one thing, flies. As temperatures rise, bugs and particularly flies begin to repopulate, and it doesn't matter which species of livestock you show, pesky flies are a nuisance to everyone. They like to invade our barns, bite at our animals and can carry diseases. With proper prevention including barn management, daily care and good nutrition, you can do your best to limit your number of unwanted guests this summer.

1. Scoop the Poop

Flies breed and thrive in manure. So, the first step to total fly control is keeping your pens and barn as clean as possible. If you tie your cattle in their pen, make sure you clean their stalls regularly. If cattle are in a cooler, the temperature-controlled environment should help reduce flies already, but go a step further and limit the amount of time you are going in and out of the door, so flies don't get inside. For smaller species like pigs, sheep and goats, be sure to pick the pens throughout the day if you can, in order to keep fresh waste away from the animals. Also consider scooping out any urine-soaked bedding. The longer it sits, the more the ammonia smell will attract flies. When all of the feces and urine is cleaned out of the pen, you should haul the waste as far away from your barn as you can. The closer it is to the barn, the closer the flies will be. Taking it away ensures flies won't have a breeding ground to reproduce near your barn.

2. Spray at the Source

Depending on your location and the humidity, you might want to spray an insecticide around your premises to keep flies and other insects from making themselves a permanent home in your barn. If you have the means, and flies are big problem because of weather or number of animals in the barn, consider investing in a fly control system that mists insecticide throughout the barn on a timed system. These will help a lot with eliminating flies and are common in pig, horse and large cattle barns.

If you don't want to spray an insecticide, there are also some other tools you can look into for your barn, such as hanging fly traps, sticky paper or an electric trap. You could also consider poisonous fly bait on the ground, but keep in mind this could be dangerous if livestock were to consume it or if you have other four-legged helpers running around like dogs or cats.

3. Spray the Victim

Spray isn't just for your barn and the premises. There are also many livestock sprays on the market that are safe and effective to use with a variety of animals to keep the flies away. Be sure to read and follow the label directions and use accordingly. Also pay attention to how much of it you put on if it is an oil-based product. Too much of it can cause your animal to get hotter and more uncomfortable.

4. Fight Flies with Feed

Flies are inevitable when you raise livestock. You can't expect to eliminate every single one of them. However, when you plan ahead and take a proactive approach with your management and feeding routine, you can greatly reduce your risk of fly overload. Less flies = less pests, less pests = happy livestock, happy livestock = healthy livestock EVERY. DAY.



Most show pigs are individually identified using a universal system known as ear notching. Learning to read ear notches is a valuable tool, not only for identifying animals but because reading ear notches is a very common showmanship question.

Ear notches may look complicated but if you can add, reading ear notches is simple. Once you know what each ear represents, and understand the five different areas of the ear that can be notched you'll be able to identity the litter and individual notches of a pig. Keep these five things in mind when reading ear notches:

1. Know which ear is which.

The right ear represents the litter number, think of it as the pigs last name. Whereas the left ear represents the individual number like the pigs first name.

An easy way to remember which ear is which, when looking at the pig, the ear to your left is the litter ear. Left = Litter.

2. Divide into quadrants.

A pig can be notched in four different quadrants. Imagine a line down the center of the ear, from the top straight down to the bottom. Now imagine a second line from midway through the ear straight across. There may also be a notch at the very tip of the ear.

3. Know what the quadrants are worth.

Starting at the bottom quadrant nearest the pig's head first, multiply each quadrant by three as you work your way around to the top. The first quadrant is worth 1, second quadrant is worth 3, third quadrant is worth 9, and the last quadrant at the top of the ear is worth 27. But remember if the tip of the ear is notched, it is worth 81.



4. Add the notches together.

Once you know what each notch is worth, add them together.

5. State the litter number followed by the individual number.

Now that you know the value of the notches you have, you can read them! State the litter number followed by dash the individual number. Such as 24-4.



Summer heat can be tough on show livestock – or any livestock for that matter. Heat stress causes increased respiration rate, suppressed appetite, fatigue and dehydration, all signs of a lowered immune response. When we think about these traits and the way they impact production, it becomes very evident that the strenuous expectations we put on show livestock to perform at the highest level and look exceptional while doing so clearly becomes a challenge.

We typically think about heat stress in extreme temperatures; however, the reality is that anytime the temperature exceeds 70 degrees livestock are adversely affected. It is imperative to follow best practices and implement some simple, but important steps to ensure fewer setbacks due to heat stress and in turn, experience greater success with our show livestock projects.

- **Be proactive.** Watch the weather and make wise decisions. It is a lot harder to bring down livestock's body temperature once they are hot than it is to manage it before it rises.
- Manage your facility to make sure it is comfortable for your animals. Be sure your animals can get to shade. Whether your facility at home has fans, misters, or even an elaborate cooler, controlling airflow is crucial. Keeping bedding wet down and misting water in the air will also help cool the air that fans push through your facility.
- Modify your feeding program to accommodate cooler periods. Just like humans, livestock don't want to eat
 when it is extremely hot. Feed earlier in the mornings so they have a chance to eat and be moved into the barn
 before it gets hot. Also pay attention to the location of their water supply. Smaller troughs provide more water
 flow and result in cooler water. Make sure lines that serve as water sources are not exposed to sun and heat
 resulting in the water in the lines to get extremely hot.
- Rinse animals with cool water to help drop their core temperature. When rinsing, focus on cooling their underline and head as it will help cool them faster. Don't just get them wet but allow cool water to run over them a while to help drop their body temperature. In extreme heat, rinse multiple times daily.
- Plan ahead. It doesn't take long for livestock to feel the impact of heat stress when they are removed from the comforts of a temperature-controlled environment. It is essential to think about this prior to leaving for a show. For cattle that have been kept in a cooler it is very important to raise the temperature of the cooler a week to 10 days ahead, every day slowly increasing the thermostat to help them acclimate. Taking them straight from a cooler to a hot show will cause extreme stress which will ruin your opportunity for success.
- Use Supplements. Sure Champ has developed products to help your animals regulate their body temperatures, naturally. - Strategically plan when you haul to shows. Hauling at night is the most ideal to help reduce the time they will be exposed to the heat of a trailer. Make sure you have adjusted ventilation on trailer to allow for adequate air flow while traveling. Once you arrive to the show it's critical to maintain the same schedule of caring for your stock. Continue to feed early and maintain body temperature by keeping animals rinsed regularly and under fans. Heat stress can be a challenge at shows but can be turned into an advantage for those who prepare properly. Stay positive, stay cool and prep to win!


